PROJECT: Belle Isle South Shore, Detroit, MI

DESCRIPTION: Belle Isle is a 962 acre park in the City of Detroit, located at the upper end of the Detroit River in Southeast Michigan. The proposed project involves the construction of a shoreline erosion protection project for a section of the Belle Isle south shoreline that is experiencing severe erosion.

STAGE: PDA (Planning & Design Analysis)

STATUS: Design and engineering of alternative solutions has been completed. NEPA documentation is complete; FONSI signed Nov. 19, 2003. Cost estimate revisions and economic reevaluation are ongoing. In the January 27, 2004, Detroit status meeting, the City of Detroit confirmed that there is a drainage problem which floods the roadway at this site, with surface runoff from this problem causing the shoreline erosion. The City of Detroit Water Department must first fix this problem before Federal funds are expended to repair the shoreline.

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
