**PROJECT:** Frankenmuth, Saginaw County, Michigan - (I)

**DESCRIPTION:** The US Army Corps of Engineers completed the Cass River Flood Control Project of 1965 to protect the City of Frankenmuth, Michigan from flood events associated with the Cass River. The flood control project included the construction of flood walls and levees. Recently, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) conducted studies which prompted a revision to the FEMA flood insurance rate map for the City of Frankenmuth, Michigan. The revised FEMA flood insurance rate maps changed the flood designation of the downtown area which will necessitate flood proofing existing buildings and restricting future expansions in the downtown area. The US Army Corps will conduct a Review of Completed Projects Reconnaissance Study under the authority of Section 216 of the 1970 Flood Control Act (P.L. 91-611). Section 216 studies review operations of completed projects, when found advisable due to changed physical, economic or environmental conditions. The study will review the effectiveness of the completed flood control project and to identify possible solutions to ensure the project is providing the required flood control protection.
