

**PROJECT:** Grand River at Lansing, Michigan (Lansing Grand River Waterfront Restoration) - (I)

**DESCRIPTION:** The Grand River flows through the heart of the Lansing, Michigan, and numerous bridges cross the river in the downtown area. Lansing has experienced rapid development and growth along its major waterway, the Grand River. The development of a comprehensive Master Plan of the river corridor is necessary to determine the feasibility of shoreline protection, flood control, environmental restoration, and associated purposes within the downtown area of the river.

**PROJECT AUTHORITY:** House Resolution 2679 adopted May 22, 2002 with specific language to prepare a master plan to identify and develop measures for flood control, shoreline protection, environmental restoration and protection, recreation and associated purposes at and in the vicinity.

**STAGE:** Feasibility

**STATUS:** Grand River at Lansing, MI Reconnaissance Report, approved on April 25, 2005, recommends a Detailed Master Plan be prepared. The Master Plan would include an analysis of land use and ownership; coordination of objectives and alternatives; concept design and data collection; development of concepts for recreation and provision of public access; and finally, the development of water quality, flood risk management, and habitat restoration measures. Upon execution of a Feasibility Cost Sharing Agreement, FY12 funds will be used to commence the Master Plan.

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
