

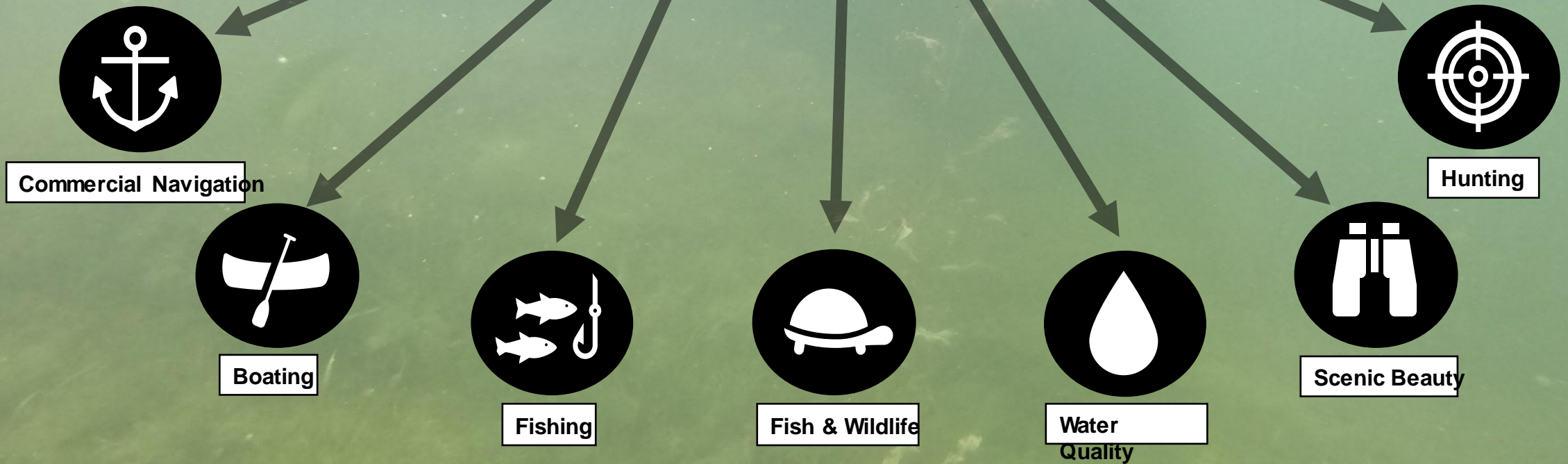

Public Trust



In-Water Work Restrictions:

- Mid-March (or ice-out, whichever is earlier) until Mid-July.
- Waivers may be issued by Fisheries Biologists.
 - Clearly identify areas being dredged
 - Clearly identify staging areas
 - Clearly identify frequency (IP)

Technical Standards:

Turbidity Barrier (1069) and Silt Curtain (1079)

There is a lot going on in the water:

- Not every species is endangered/threatened or a game species
 - Within public interest to protect and consider
- There is a lot of naturally occurring turbidity
 - Within public interest to consider man-caused excess
- In-water placement is not typical in Wisconsin
 - Placement on beach is always concurrent with water quality improvements at the site.
